

Endangered mountain animals

It is hard to estimate but scientists believe that between 200 and 2000 different species become extinct each year and most of these extinctions can be linked back to human activity.

Mountain lion

Information that you might want to include in your fact file include: where the animal lives; what the animal eats; how does the animal live? (large groups or on its own); why is the animal endangered; how many of the animal are left living in the wild; what could be done to save the mountain animal.
